PASTOR'S REPORT-

Bible Study at BSA continues on Tuesdays at 11:20 am we are currently studing Dietrich Bonhoeffer's book Life Together.

WORSHIP -Altar Guild meeting (3/8/15) had 17 members in attendance. Discussed Holy Week and beyond. We had a "Dress Rehearsal" for the Easter Vigil reset of altar. Altar Guild did a great job on all Lenten Services, & Holy Week Services.

We are working on getting a new storage system for the banners.

Diane Wisker is continuing to create a new banner(s) for the Easter Season.

YOUTH - Pastor Stephen Friedrich conducted a brief youth and family ministry meeting between services on March 29th to do some activity planning for the next couple months.

We have registered 4 youth and 3 adult counselors for the 2015 ELCA National Youth Gathering in Detroit, MI July 15-19th, 2015. The Act 2Day 4Tomorrow overnight fasting event was held at Beautiful Savior Lutheran Church in Amarillo on March 13th-14th. Pastor Stephen Friedrich led this group. This event raised money and awareness for the work of ELCA World Hunger.

The Easter Egg hunt and Resurrection Egg Story were held on April 5th, 2015 at 10am on Easter Sunday. The H2H Youth group met at church on the evening of Good Friday to fill eggs and watch the movie, *The Passion of the Christ* following Good Friday church services.

FINANCIAL NEWS

Our congregation continues with generous gifts! March giving for our General Budget was \$25,325 compared to our budgeted expectation of \$22,630. Year-to-Date giving is \$75,710 compared to our budgeted expectation of \$57,800. In addition, our congregation has contributed \$2,960 (YTD \$7,910) to the Building Fund and \$4,890 (YTD \$9,000) to all other Dedicated Accounts. Total giving for March is \$33,175 (YTD \$92,620) (see charts). Expenses for March were \$17,680 (YTD \$54,930) compared to a budgeted amount of \$26,026 (YTD \$78,080).

Since we do not yet have a Family & Youth Minister, the comparison should exclude the budgeted amount for that position. In this case, the budget for March would be \$22,809.

Expenditures continue to be significantly below budget. Giving exceeded expenditures by \$7,645 (YTD \$20,780). A reason for rejoicing and celebration: We have only one more payment to pay off our mortgage!




2.5 Things Lutherans Know About the Bible

On Friday, April 24th Rev. Dr. David Lose, now president of Philadelphia Lutheran Seminary, spoke about the bible to the 2015 NTNL Mission Assembly in Lewisville, TX. He spoke with great humor and insight about the bible and how we read it. What follows is a reworking of my notes from his presentation.

He pointed out that not everyone reads the bible in the same way. We come from various life circumstances that differ, some read literally others not, and many do not read the bible as much as we think.

Case in point. In an ELCA study, it was discovered that only 6% of ELCA adult members are doing bible study in a group setting at least once a year. That's not good news. Further bad news is that only half of our adults after confirmation will engage in any kind of bible study in the course of their lives.



Lutherans know about 2.5 things about the bible.

We know for sure that it is a really important book.

We don't know it well and that can create embarrassment and shame.

What are some of the things that keep you from reading the bible, or from enjoying reading it? It is centuries old, different cultures with different views than ours, it is broken up and doesn't always follow continuous narrative, different genres, etc.

Another reason we get tripped up is that we moved from calling it "bible" or in Greek "ta biblia" meaning the books. Calling it the "holy bible" makes us anxious about it. When we call the bible holy we can forget that the bible is a collection of stories that we're invited into.

2.5 Lutheran's know 2.5 things about the bible. The .5 thing we know is that there is a way to read the bible literally. This is quite prevalent in Amarillo and we respect how well literalists read the bible, but it doesn't satisfy us. Yet we don't know what the alternative to literalistic reading.

We think of the bible as a reference book and that's the literal reading. We understand it as a collection of information; a reference book. Reference books don't get read for sheer excitement. It is rare that reading a reference book changes your life. When we approach the bible this way, we don't tap into the bible's power to change our lives and our communities.

Dr. Lose suggested a different way to think about scripture. When we think of the bible as a reference book then the authority comes from information. What if we think of the bible as the living word of God. That's how the early church understood the bible.

To think of the bible as living word is to think of narrative truth. Narrative truth vs. Factual truth.

We live with two kinds of truth: factual truth (scientific method, how things work, key to facts is something is rationally verifiable) and narrative truth (operative of all those things you can't prove in a laboratory, to share your beliefs, your convictions, those things that are most important to you. Those are things you can't do a test on. You describe those convictions in terms of a story. Narrative is powerful, allowing us to share what we cannot prove but what are at the core of who we are.)

Which of the following two methods will reveal more about a person's true self? If they tell you five verifiable truths; or if they tell you two brief stories about themselves? The stories of course. There is something about stories that reveals the truth. The bible is a collection of stories that tell the truth of the character of God.

In Deuteronomy 5 Moses addresses the people of Israel "The LORD God made a covenant with us at Horeb. It was not with our ancestors that the LORD made this covenant, but with us, with all of us who are alive here today." If you have read the story of Exodus then you'll know that what Moses says is not factually true. Actually God spoke to their ancestors, their parents... and their parents blew it, didn't trust God and refused to go into the Promised Land.

So God let them wander in the wilderness until they all died and only their children were left. Moses spoke to the children in Deuteronomy 5 "God made a covenant with us..." This is about narrative truth. Moses reminds them of their history and is drawing a new generation into God's narrative with Israel.

- Narrative stories are powerful they help us connect with each other.
- Stories help us communicate what we deeply believe.
- Narratives give us hope that sheer facts cannot.
- Stories tell us the truth we most care about.

Scripture is a collection of stories, and collections of confessions. One thing that holds bible together is that each is written by a person so gripped by their experience of the living God that they had to tell it, sharing it in a way that was familiar to them (through poetry, laws, songs, stories, etc). Confessions of people who have seen God, a collection of past sightings of God.

These stories are different and they help us to pay attention and see God active in our lives today. When we read scripture we pay attention to the outlines of the story. We won't have an encounter with voice from burning bush like Moses in Exodus 3, but knowing the story helps you make sense of your story today that you might see God in your life today.

Narrative truth always leads to narrative invitation. Stories always have behind them an invitation to come alongside. When reading the bible the point is to find yourself in the story, recognizing in those characters something that is familiar to you. When that happens, at that moment the Bible becomes for us the word of God, when our story and God's story connect. All things are possible. May you see yourself in the story, in God's story. And may God's living word captivate and transform you like Moses, like Mary, like the twelve who followed Christ.

A Christian Steward Is Designed for Goodness and Generosity

In the opening verses of Genesis, we are told that on the sixth day God makes man and woman in God's image. The biblical narrative in Genesis tells us that we are part and parcel of the created order, that we are deeply interconnected and integrated into creation. yet we are made at the apex of God's creative activity. Because we are made in God's generous image, blessedness and goodness are part of our spiritual DNA. The capacity to give and receive love, to be generous, to share is an expression of our imagehood. God gifts us with the freedom and liberty to reflect his life. It is true that generosity is a learned behavior, and it is scripturally true that we are designed for goodness and generosity. In embracing a practice of generosity, we are becoming the people God created us to be.

A Christian Steward Trusts in a God of **Abundance** Our biblical faith

tells us that from the very beginning God infuses creation—the sun, the moon, vegetation, and all his creatures—with vitality, fruitfulness, abundance, and intelligent order. Dr. Walter Bruggemann refers to our creation story as a liturgy of abundance. We know most fully the abundant grace of God in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, chief steward par excellence. We stand in the flow of God's abundant grace each time we resist the temptation to make anxious and fear-based choices and instead make choices that flow from trust and gratitude in God, the source of abundant life.

A Christian Steward Lives in Freedom from Idolatry

The word steward comes from the Greek word oikonomia, which means "manager" or "caretaker of the household." We are called to care for God's household. A biblical steward understands that all belongs to God; there is no transfer of ownership. As God's stewards, we don't own anything. When we recognize that the entirety of life is a gift from God, we are less likely to hold on so tightly, as gifts are intended to be shared. The practice of the tithe, the offering of the first 10 percent of something of value, is a faith statement acknowledging God's ultimate ownership. The practice of the tithe keeps idolatry at bay. We know an idol is working in our lives when we believe that things like money, power, and prestige are the source of life and will save us. The practice of the tithe is a path to living in freedom. When it comes to making choices about how I share resources, I'm aware that my first impression, impulse, or instinct will be fearful in some way, shape, or form. That may be my initial reaction, but it does not have to be my choice or decision. The tithe has taught me to live with empty, open hands. I can hold my scarcity-based

You Have the Words of Eternal Life

That's right. You.

Peter said it about Jesus. But now Jesus says it about you. "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, . . . teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you" (Matt. 28:19-20) are the words with which our Lord commissions all of his disciples. When we read the words of scripture during the service on Sunday we are sharing the words of eternal life. The redeemed life. The new life in Christ. The life that lasts—eternally.

It is no small task. While it may be true that anybody can read, not every reading is riveting. But we might also agree that the words of eternal life ought to, need to, and certainly can engage our imaginations, help us understand the law's demands, and assure us of God's grace.



Our church will provide a workshop on *date, time, place* in which we will explore many ways and means to improve our reading of scripture aloud in worship. If you are currently among the rotation of readers, or would be willing to give some thought to reading for the assembly on Sunday mornings, this one's for you.

After all, we have the words of eternal life . . . and we want to sound like it!

Ten Adverbial Encouragements for Readers

- 1. Read Loudly. Fill the room with sound.
- 2. Read Slowly. Allow concepts and images time to develop in the head of the hearer.
- 3. Read Distinctly. Clip the consonants.
- 4. Read Meaningfully. Know what the text says before attempting to share the thought.
- 5. Read Energetically. *Enthusiasm for the word is contagious.*
- 6. Read Gladly. This is happy work.
- 7. Read Reverently. This is holy work.
- 8. Read Intentionally. "Sustain the weary with a word."
- 9. Read Congruently. Allow the body to echo the vocalized text.
- 10. Read Urgently. This work is a matter of life and death.

TIPS FOR READERS

- Slow down. A slower delivery allows the hearer to follow the train of thought rather than struggling to keep up.
- Allow the words to sink in.
- Pause at the periods.
- Take a breath at the semicolons.
- Do not ignore the commas.
- Read every word. There is a tendency under pressure to allow one's voice to fall off at the end of sentences and at the end of paragraphs. Be aware of that danger and avoid it.
- Read every word with intention, from the beginning of the text to the end.
- Enunciate. Lip laziness can be fatal. For words to be understood, the reader must be intentional about speaking crisply.


