Mysha Hawkins reflected on what it means to “Rise Up”. *“I think it means to stand with others, for the sake of something good. It means to fight for those who aren’t strong. To step up to the challenge and make sure no one is left unheard.”*

FINANCIAL NEWS

Cash equivalent asset balance at the end of June is \$138,930 (\$31,700 increase for the year). "Investments in our Endowment Fund is \$118,605 (\$3,010 increase for the year).

We're back on track with donations from our generous congregation. "Donations for June exceeded anticipated by \$15,500.

"June giving to our General Budget was \$32,830 compared to our anticipated amount of \$17,350.

"Year to Date giving is \$147,795 compared to our anticipated amount of \$124,180.

"Building Fund donations were \$250, indicating donations being diverted to the General Fund. "In addition, our congregation has contributed \$4,000 (YTD \$22,245) to all other Dedicated Accounts.

"Total giving for June is \$37,050 (YTD \$180,900) . "

Donations are currently \$9,500 less than needed to fund a Youth & Family Minister full time.

Expenses for June were \$19,200 (YTD \$122,320) compared to a budgeted amount of \$27,250 (YTD \$157,300). "Since we do not yet have a Family & Youth Minister, the comparison should exclude the budgeted amount for that position."In this case, the budget for June would be \$24,030.

Donations for June exceeded expenditures

Thank you for the part you played in sending our group to the National Youth Gathering for this incredible faith formation experience. Your faithful example set the stage for these brothers and sisters to follow Jesus and to be open to this experience. Your financial contributions to our trip fundraising, and your long term offerings which are shared with the wider church made this experience possible for 30,000 youth as well as for our four youth and three adults.

Your job from here is to be inquisitive of our participants to ask them about their experience and how God is calling us to Rise Up here in Amarillo. Ask them how they see the Holy Spirit at work in their lives. Join them in prayer, bible study, games of theological connections, and in mission work. The value of generosity

A mark of a dedicated steward is generosity, whether it is of the variety of the Good Samaritan, who put himself at physical risk and personal expense to protect the man he found beaten on the road, or a simple gesture that takes only a few moments of time. We give in response to the generosity God shows us with daily blessings and with eternal salvation.

Paul was particularly impressed with the generosity shown by the Macedonian church. In 2 Corinthians 8 he describes this small congregation as poor but eager to serve. "For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability," he writes in verse 3.

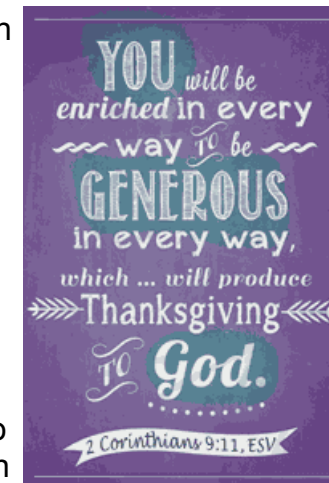
Often times, though, we can struggle to translate that verse into 21st century life. What does it mean to reasonably give what we are able? That question can easily overwhelm us even without considering how one can give beyond that standard. Still, we simply can't ignore the benefits of generosity in our lives until we figure out exactly what portion of our possessions meets our needs and the rest is simply excess.

Perhaps it is in the act of giving itself on a daily basis that leads us to how we should answer that question. For individual acts of generosity often slip from mind once they have been carried out. After all, we aren't working on a quid pro quo basis – you scratch my back, God, and I will scratch yours.

My understanding of generosity grew out of an incident in which I failed to act generously. I was a senior in high school at the time, and one day at lunch I stepped into a restroom. I and another friend saw a boy perched up on a heat register staring out the window. His clothes were dirty. The expression on his face was blank, and when my friend Randy asked what was wrong, he remained silent, staring out the window.

I had recognized the boy as a junior who was a sprinter on the track team. We crossed paths in the gym weight room a couple of times, and I knew his name. Because he remained silent, I backed away from calling out his name and repeating the question. I knew he was poor, and if he was bothered by a lack of clean clothes or money to eat lunch, I chose not to find out. He was slightly shorter than I, and I immediately thought of a stack of clothes on a closet shelf at home. The clothes were ones that I wore a year or two earlier that were now too small for me. The shirts would have fit him, and he might not have wanted them. But I lacked the courage to step forward and offer them.

In stepping away, I realized that one of the benefits of generosity is that we live up to the faith we profess on Sundays with the creeds and the communion table. Had I followed through, the clothes would not have made life perfect for him. He would have still struggled to find his place. But that struggle might have been less daunting if he had the knowledge that someone else cared about him. What I missed is the chance to say, "Christ died for you, too" by my actions and creating the op-

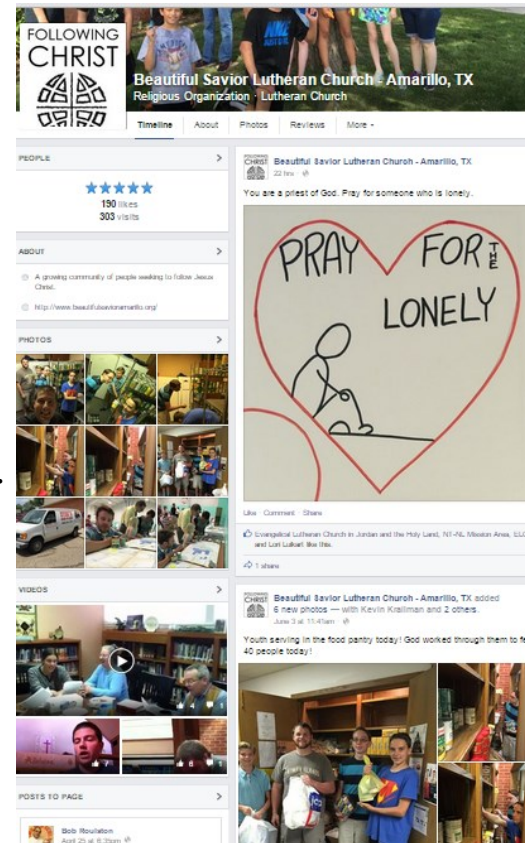

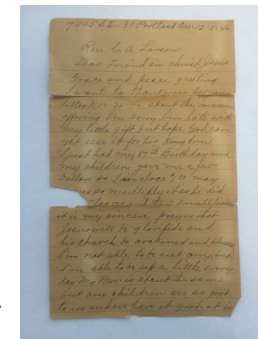
Where were you on December 5th, 1946?

Today we received from a congregation a letter that they recently found in the cracks behind one of their filing cabinets.



The letter is from a parishioner to his pastor that was dated on December 5th, 1946. He went on to explain that he felt like he needed to share his gift with others, and so he included a \$1 bill and asked for it to go towards the mission offering.

We are humbled, thankful, and in awe of this letter. We are humbled by this parishioner's desire to share what he had - knowing that even a dollar would make a difference. We are thankful for the pastor for sharing the good news and for lifting up the important



Things we experienced at the National Youth Gathering.

Rev. Jerbi spoke about one of his parishioners who was shot. Veronika Scott told us her story about her addict parents who said she would never amount to anything and now she runs a company. Natasha Miller spoke beautiful poetry. In our Mission Area bible study day (called Proclaim Story) we listened to teenagers tell their stories of when they had seen God at work in their lives. Rev. Runi Abdulmasih, a Lutheran pastor from Jerusalem, told us his story and how we need to remember the first Christians came from the Middle East. We took communion twice. We were blessed by Bishop Tim from the North Carolina Synod, and Bishop Mike Rhyne from the Allegheny Synod in Pennsylvania. We were rained on twice. We talked a lot about the Gospel of Mark and the healing of the paralytic. We walked the streets of Detroit! I flew on my first airplane. I grew closer with everyone. We added onto a tree of faith mural. We met a few new people and saw my first rock concert. I grew in my faith. Someone asked me for money.

The singing group which included two members of the Temptations. Enjoying gelato in Greek Town. Lots of coffee. We proclaimed Justice with our mission project where we cleaned up an overgrown-neglected alley – We cut branches, dug up weeds and picked up trash. We sang “Oceans” and “Hallelujah”. It was humid! We got tattoos (temporary and they said “Jesus is Good News”). People gave us tons of bracelets. Marian Edelman (one of the first African-American female lawyers in Mississippi) spoke.

Bible study with our Mission Area for four hours on the healing of the Paralytic. Trip Lee’s mini-concert (he even did one rap song slowly and acapella so that all of the adults could understand!). Rachel Kurtz sang and led worship. We gave and received Free Hugs! We rode bumper cars/bicycles at the Lutheran Colleges booth. We looked at several Lutheran Colleges including Texas Lutheran University in Spring, TX. We went to a show for Washington State.

The bus driver said that we really helped the city, “gave it a big shot in the arm.” We heard about the struggles not only in Detroit but around the world. We got to see the amazing architecture of Detroit. We stayed on the 60th floor of the tallest hotel in North America.

Went to concert with Trip Lee and Skillet who rapped and sang about Jesus. We experienced hospitality from the people of Detroit. They are very nice and said thank you for helping out. I experienced a common love for Jesus here in the people of Detroit and the people at the Gathering. I heard people talk about their stories where they came from rough places and ended up doing well – some of the speakers. The bus driver on our way into Detroit talked about Jesus!

I bought a free hugs shirt because it is swag (swag is a term that teenagers use which roughly translates as “cool” or “hip”). I have given about 40 hugs so far today on Sunday. We got lots of wristbands from different churches; also clothes pins, and buttons. We took a group picture at the Mission Investment Fund booth. We went to the Mosaic booth and talked about how people with disabilities get ignored and have really low paying jobs. We need to raise awareness. We made hats for kids with cancer. We cut up blankets to make them. It was hot while we were here, and rainy one day. John

and I (Ethan) show cased our “guns” (our muscles) to lots of people. Sadly we didn’t find the veterinarian or our beach ball (jokes connected with showing off their muscles). We got temporary tattoos, “Jesus is good news”, and learned a lot at the proclaim story day with the rest of our Mission Area. One guy told us the story about how God worked through him to help a friend who was really depressed and about to kill herself.

to speak to many of the workers. She was a sign of God’s abundant presence and how we are in this together. Detroit is on the rise, good things are going on there. We were blessed to be a part of it, a part of Detroit for five days!

We met people from MN, WI, Dakota, NC, SC, etc. In total we met people from 54 of the 56 Synods of the ELCA and just about every state in the USA. It was mind blowing to walk into Ford Field for the first time and see all those Lutherans

In the interactive center we did the walk for water, I got intestinal worms in the scenario, that 5 gallon jug of water was heavy. I only carried it for 0.1 mile. We played disability dodgeball. Pastor had a sling, Mysha and Ethan were in a wheel chairs, John and David had vision impairments, and Courtney was allergic to all the dodgeballs except the yellow ones. On our Proclaim Justice day as we were cleaning up the alley, Mrs. Hall, one of the local residents came to meet us. Like the story of the widow’s mite, she generously brought us some candy and stopped

The difference that mission makes
A matter of life and death?

From the book ["Start with Why: How Great Leaders Inspire Everyone to Action"](#) by Simon Sinek: Consider the story of two stonemasons. You walk up to the first stonemason and ask, "Do you like your job?" He looks up at you and replies, "I've been building this wall for as long as I can remember. The work is monotonous. I work in the scorching hot sun all day. The stones are heavy and lifting them day after day can be back-breaking. I'm not even sure if this project will be completed in my lifetime. But it's a job. It pays the bills." You thank him for his time and walk on.



About thirty feet away, you walk up to a second stonemason. You ask him the same question, "Do you like your job?" He looks up and replies, "I love my job. I'm building a cathedral. Sure, I've been working on this wall for as long as I can remember, and yes, the work is sometimes monotonous. I work in the scorching hot sun all day. The stones are heavy and lifting them day after day can be back-breaking. I'm not even sure if this project will be completed in my lifetime. But I'm building a cathedral."

WHAT these two stonemasons are doing is exactly the same; the difference is, one has a sense of purpose. He feels like he belongs. He comes to work to be a part of something bigger than the job he's doing. Simply having a sense of WHY changes his entire view of his job.

Did you know that social scientists have discovered that older adults have twice the risk of dying if their lives lack a sense of meaning and purpose? Perhaps we can say then that meaning, purpose and mission are more than just deep questions, but are really a matter of life and death.
